How Woyld This Work?

 The following weeks students will start by gathering in a circle and each sharing about their book and answer peers questions, then we will read for the remainder of the time

 The final week of the month students will get to pick some of their books to put on a shelf in the library called Readers Recomend



Extensions

- We could take a field trip to the library
- Students can create petitions for teachers to use their book in class
- You could buddy older readers with younger readers if they are willing
- You could have students write their own books and display them
- You could write a book as a group
- You can invite an author





Only 59% of BC Elementary Students Feel like they belong in school



Only 67% of BC Elementary students feel welcome at school



71% of students are considered proficient readers by grade 7
